9.0	TIMC Recommendations and Concerns  — Inclusive Access (Monika)	Inclusive Access is where a publisher will provide a discount on electronic textbooks, providing that the class commit to the opt-out process. The opt-out process is where everyone will get access to the textbook on the first day, but then will get charged for the book. This can have issues because of cost transparency. Textbook publishers can also increase the prices. Publishers want to get rid of the used textbook market. When guaranteeing the e-text, it allows them to raise the prices a little bit more. Many publishers are not printing physical texts because it is more expensive. Inclusive access: some colleges are doing this on a campus-wide level. The college pays a flat fee, and then has access to all textbooks. This does not necessarily work for sequence courses. Another logistical complication is that we are unsure on who would be responsible for monitoring/collecting collections for books that are not returned.  Some recommendations should include feedback and surveys, which should be done before the contract.  TIMC recommends doing opt-in and not opt-out. Students should make that conscious decision about purchasing something rather than the decision to opt-out. Recommendation moving forward is to have a workgroup. What is the percentage of reading material would this affect? Monika says that you would have to enter into inclusive access. Susan from the bookstore is part of TIMC and is trying to get it here at the bookstore.

There are very specific circumstances where this may be beneficial. Unless they are within these guidelines, within the TIMC recommendations, it would not be beneficial for the students on our campus. There is an appeal as to what the solutions are to reduce



		costs. Chisa recommends that it would be appropriate for this to go through senate.

10.0	AP/BP 4250 Probation and Dismissal Workgroup update (Francisco, George, Chisa)  • AP 4250 draft • BP 4250 draft	Francisco shared that a workgroup reviewed AP/BP 4250. Julie Perez Garcia, Francisco, George, Chisa and Roger are on this workgroup.  The workgroup referenced Title V for guidance to updated language. They were able to make some edits/modifications and wanted to ensure that our alignment was with Title V.  BP 4250  Made marks on academic probation and made modifications to the language regarding that.  George reviewed the Dismissal component. Also going to make modifications to our processes here at Mt.SAC.  The difference between what we do and what they do is that language shows that there is a "primary term," which was not completely clear. "Primary term" is replaced with intersessions. Is dismissal always imminent or is subject to dismissal?  There is first level of dismissal; the 2nd level of dismissal is subject. When a student sits out for 2 primary terms, they are then allowed to come back. After a year, the student has to reapply.  Regardless of the issue of probation and dismissal, after a year, the student needs to reapply.  We are limited to dismissing for more than one semester.  "dismissed" should replace "subject to dismissal" in both "Dismissal" paragraphs  AP 4250 does not have reinstatement and dismissal. Would need to come back as a group, AP 4255 has dismissal and reinstatement language.  Before being dismissed, they are notified of the availability of college support services.  "Restriction on Enrollment" needs to be edited because it is older language. Francisco says that this is the language in Title V.	Sara and Eva will be added to the workgroup.
