AMLA 41W: American Language Basic to Low-Intermediate Writing (4 units)

Course Description:

Basic to low intermediate grammar and writing for non-native speakers.

Lecture Topical Outline:

- 2. Pre-writing techniques such as brainstorming, clustering, journaling
- 3. Groups of sentences with simple, compound, and time clause elements
- 4. Original sentences with consistent grammatical accuracy
- 5. Global and local error editing

- 7. Sentences in affirmative, negative, and question/answer formats
- 8. Sentence patterns
- 9. Model sentences looking at structure, vocabulary, and ideas
- 10. Critical thinking strategies by paraphrasing key ideas from level-appropriate sources
- 11. Final exam

Course Measurable Objectives:

- 1. Create sentence clusters while utilizing level-appropriate grammar scope and sequence.
- 2. Combine groups of sentences using basic sentence structures, compound sentences, and time clauses.
- 3. Compose complete sentences in affirmative, negative, and question and answer formats.
- 4. Apply knowledge of global and local errors to edit sentences.
- 5. Apply pre-writing techniques to construct and evaluate ideas for use in level-appropriate writing.

Course Methods of Evaluation:

- 1. Fourteen to eighteen written sentence clusters over the course of the semester of varying but level-appropriate lengths (7-9 of these assignments must be written in class)
- 2. Objective exams with multiple choice, completion, matching, short answer, and true/false prompts relating to grammatical structures and sentence formulation

Sample Assignments:

- 1. Make a list of ten adjectives that could be used to describe you. Then pick three and write a sentence about yourself with each of the three adjectives.
- 2. Write five sentences to describe what you see in a given pictures. Underline the subject in each sentence.
