2.	Review the Budget Committee Meeting Summary of April 23, 2025	The Budget Committee reviewed and approved the meeting summary of April 23, 2025.	The meeting summary was approved.	
3.	Report from IEC Representative	Kelly, Vice President of Instruction, provided an update. A small work group is revamping and updating the program review process for both instructional and administrative units. The proposed recommendation will be presented to PAC for consideration. There was also discussion on Mt. SAC 2035 and the role of the Institutional Effectiveness Committee (IEC). Once the Mt. SAC 2035 plan is finalized, the IEC will be responsible for evaluating and implementing the accountability measures associated with the plan.		
4.	May Revise	Shannon Carter, Acting Vice President of Administrative Services, provided an overview of the Governor's May Revision to the state budget. While the January proposal projected a balanced budget, the May Revision now reflects a \$12 billion deficit due to economic factors such as delayed tax filings and market volatility. The revised proposal includes a 2.30% cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) for community colleges, slightly lower than the 2.43% proposed in January. Funding for

5.	Joint Analysis	systemwide enrollment growth was increased to support a 2.35% growth rate, and capital outlay funds remain designated for 31 projects across the system. Mt. SAC will see ongoing COLA adjustments to programs including Adult Education, EOPS, DSPS, CalWORKs, and CARE. Notable state investments include support for part-time faculty health benefits, nursing program expansion, technology initiatives, and student support programs. Mt. SAC's Library Replacement Project is also among those receiving state funding. Fiscal Services will continue to monitor economic developments and communicate any significant budget impacts to the campus community. The Joint Analysis of the Governor's 2025–26 May Revision was mentioned during the meeting, and it was noted that the document will	
6.	Bond Financing	Zak Gallegos requested a meeting to provide an overview of bond financing, specifically, how it is reflected in the budget, who makes the funding decisions, and what oversight exists. Shannon Carter explained that a Citizens' Oversight Committee is in place and that funding approvals are managed through the COMPACT process. She noted that bond funds are a separate "bucket" of money and will prepare a presentation over the summer to help clarify the process. Additionally, the Facilities Advisory Committee (FAC) will play a more active role in reviewing projects before they are submitted to COMPACT.	Zak also requested that a future agenda include an item on Budget Transfers for further discussion.
