2. For over fifty years, advertisers and film companies have benefit from product *taken* 

placement. Since the 1970s, tobacco companies have took advantage of loopholes in the released

laws to advertise their products. For example, in Superman: The Movie, release in 1978,

Lois Lane smoked Marlboro cigarettes even though the original cartoon character didn't

smoke, and in *Superman II*, villains threw a Marlboro truck back and forth across a New York street.

- 3. By 1984, audiences had saw tobacco product placements in over five hundred film raised productions. Health groups have consistently raise concerns about the impact of movie taught smoking on teen smoking rates. Of course, many youths are teached that smoking is cool when they watch Brad Pitt or Scarlett Johanssen smoke onscreen. Emily Nixon, a twenty-thought six-year-old college student, admits that she had never thinked about smoking until she saw the 1994 film Reality Bites. "I wanted to be like the cool characters in the film, and they all smoked. The only non-smoker was the dorky guy," she now says.
- 4. In 1990, tobacco companies promised Congress that they would stop promoting their broken products in films. The companies insist that they have not broke the rules. Some groups are skeptical, however. Stanton Glanz, a professor of medicine at the University bound of California, points out that although U.S. tobacco companies are binded to the agreement, their international subsidiaries can offer money in exchange for product screen time in American films.

5. Jeffry Kluger, in an article that was wrote for *Time*, mentions that today "cigarettes are more common onscreen than at any other time since mid-century: 75 percent of all made. Hollywood films show tobacco use." However, some producers have make a difference.

needs to smoke. Doran agreed. However, the film shows Emma Thompson coughing and stubbing out her cigarette in "a palmful of spit." Thus, producers like Doran prove that smoking doesn't have to appear glamorous in films.
