Section 2: Tag Questions

A tag question is a statement followed by a mini-question called a "question tag". Tag questions are a way of asking the other person to make a comment and *to keep the conversation going*; as a result, tag questions are very important to use when making small talk. We use question tags at the end of statements to ask for confirmation. They mean something like: "Am I right?" or "Do you agree?" The basic structure of a tag question is:

Statement + Question Tag

+	-	-	+
Positive Statement	Negative Tag	Negative Statement	Positive Tag
It is going to rain,	isn't it?	It isn't going to rain,	is it?

You swim,don't you?You don't swim,do you?Notice that the question tag repeats the helping verb (or main verb when be) from the statement and changes itto negative or positive. The question tag should also include the same subject as the statement.

Statement	Question Tag
It (subject) is not (negative be verb) going to rain,	is (positive be verb) it (subject)?
You (subject) have (positive helping verb) eaten,	haven't (negative helping verb) you (subject)?

Note: In the **Hobbies** example above, the helping verb *do* in the statement - "You swim," - is not stated because the tense is simple present. However, the question tag uses *do* to make "don't you?" It is also possible to say: "You do swim, don't you?"


