

Board games are one of the most common free-time activities for people throughout history. Around 3500 BC, Egyptians played a game called *Senet*. Today, a trip to the toy section of any major store will show you dozens of different board games you can play with friends or family. The term *board games* generally refers to games played at a table using a pre-printed layout on a stiff board, like the one shown below. However, we also use *board game* to talk about games that don't necessarily include a board, but are played using cards or dice instead.

While you probably have some experience playing board games, you may not be familiar with the vocabulary used to play these games in English. Words like *turn, token, and roll* have special uses when we are talking about playing games. This SDLA will introduce you to some of this vocabulary so you can play these popular games in English like a pro!

- 3. Players take turns rolling the dice and moving around the board. In card games, every time the last player finishes their turn, a new **round** begins.
- 4. In cards games, one player must **deal** a set number of cards to the other players.
- 5. Before you begin playing, it's important to **shuffle** the cards so they are in a random order.
- 6. Some games require you to **trade** resources like cards and money with other players. Other games might sometimes ask you to **trade** spaces on the board with another player.
- 7. If you can't play anything using the cards in your hand, you must **draw** a new card from the deck.
- 8. The **object** of this game is to get to the end of the board. The player who finishes first wins the game.
- 9. When playing a new game, you should first read the **instructions** carefully. They will tell you what to do.
- 10. In some games, if you roll **doubles**, you get to take an extra turn!
