



A parent-teacher conference is a meeting between a student's parent(s) and teacher to discuss the child's progress academically and socially. Other topics such as homework and emotional or friend challenges may also come up.

The best parent-teacher conferences follow a set agenda in which both the parent(s) and teacher prepare something to say. The teacher should have examples of a child's schoolwork, any relevant test scores, and observations of the child's class participation, academic work and social growth to share with the parents. As a parent, it may be helpful to prepare some questions for the conference about anything that confused you or raised a concern during the previous few months of school.

You will most likely have one or two regularly scheduled parent-teacher conferences each school year to stay updated on your child's education.

- 4. How is my child's attitude in school?
- 5. How are my child's relationships in school?
- 6. What is easy for my child?
- 7. What is difficult for my child?
- 8. How can I help my child?
