Even though these comics are supposed to make you laugh, not feeling well or getting injured is definitely not funny. In real life, when you visit a doctor, it can be a challenge because you may not know how to explain exactly how you feel. Although you know how your body feels, choosing the wrong words can greatly affect how the doctor understands your illness and provides you with appropriate treatment. This SDLA will help you learn important words to better express how you are feeling to a doctor.

Comic Answers: In comic 1, the Statue of Liberty is experiencing arm pain because she has been holding her torch for many years without any rest. The patient in comic 2 is suffering from a dry scalp. One major symptom includes a cactus growing out of his head. Finally, in comic 3, the young boy has a contagious illness called the chicken pox which has spread to his mother and the doctor. The most common sign is the itchy red rash all over their bodies.


