

#### Section 1: Introduction

"This Fourth of July is yours, not mine. You may rejoice, I must mourn."

-Frederick Douglass, American abolitionist and former slave, 1852



You probably already know that the United States has a terrible history of enslavement and mistreatment of Black Americans. You might also know that the American Civil War (1861-1865) marked the end of slavery in the United States. However, partly because communication technology was slow in the 19<sup>th</sup> century and partly because many slave owners did not want to accept the outcome of the war, hundreds of thousands of Black people remained enslaved for months after the war ended. Juneteenth celebrates June 19, 1865, the day that all enslaved people were finally freed in the United States.

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# Section 4: Symbols of Juneteenth

Though its popularity has gone up and down over the years, Juneteenth celebrations still occur every year across the United States. In fact, the popularity of Juneteenth surged in 2020, and many Americans who had never heard about the holiday are now beginning to recognize it.

Today's celebrations are very similar to what they were all the way back in 1865. Communities gather at parks or in backyards for barbecues and other festivities. Sometimes, there are even historical reenactments and music festivals. In this section, you will learn about some important symbols that are part of the celebrations.

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# Parks and Community Spaces

In the early days of Juneteenth celebrations, the newly freed blacks were not allowed to gather in public spaces that
were owned by white people. In Houston, Texas in 1872, a formerly enslaved Baptist minister, Reverend Jack Yates
organized a group of his church members who put their money together to purchase 10 acres of open land for their
Juneteenth celebration. That land became Emancipation Park, where Juneteenth celebrations are still held to this day. Ir
recent decades, the park has undergone major renovations to add and upgrade walking trails, a swimming pool,
monuments (Picture:), and a community center (Picture:).
Flags
There are two flags commonly associated with Juneteenth celebrations: the Juneteenth flag and the Pan-African flag.
The Juneteenth flag (Picture:) uses the same colors as the American flag: red, white, and blue. This emphasizes
that the enslaved people and their descendants are also Americans. The star in the center represents Texas, where
Juneteenth began. Texas' state flag also has a star (Picture:), and it is known as the Lone Star State. The bursting
star around the middle star represents the new freedom of the formerly enslaved people.
The Pan-African flag (Picture:) is used by Black people in many countries to support freedom and equality for
Black people. The red represents the blood that unites all people of Black African ancestry, and the blood shed for
freedom, the black represents Black people as a unified group, and the green represents the abundant natural wealth of
Africa. You might see these colors used in other ways during Juneteenth celebrations as well (Picture:).
Food
The main meal on Juneteenth usually consists of barbecue (Picture:), including hot links (spicy sausages), ribs,
hamburgers, etc. Other foods include Southern-style foods like collard greens (Picture:), macaroni and cheese
(Picture:), and potato salad (Picture:). Red food, especially red velvet cake (Picture:), and red
drinks are an important part of Juneteenth celebrations. The red symbolizes the blood shed by the enslaved people.
During the first Juneteenth, the newly freed Blacks celebrated by drinking strawberry soda (Picture:), a luxury
item they weren't allowed to have when they were enslaved
