What is a Mascot'

- Something adopted by a group to represent them (ex. Geico Gecko)
- Embodies the group's collective energy; fosters team spirit
- Is a symbol of the group, sometimes serves as a spokesperson
- Often related to the moniker (a moniker is the nickname, ex. Mounties or Dodgers or Bruins)

Gender neutral

Reflects our location/heritage

A native plant or animal

Original creative design (not clip art)

SUCCESS CRITERIA

Professional quality

Represents the college well

Allows for broad community opinions to be heard

Input from students, employees, community

Follows characteristics the group determines as critical Culturally competent

Popular Survey Write-in Ideas

- Phoenix (not native animal)
- Dragon (not native animal)
- Goat (similar long horn sheep did not perform well, committee didn't find it a good match)
- Eagle (not native to our local mountains)
- Wolf (not native to local mountains)
- Coyote (negative homophone with human smuggler)
- Squirrels (does not align with popular mascot qualities)
- Mountaineer type (no humans; what would represent a Mountaineer?)
- Dinosaur, such as T-Rex (not a native animal)



Final Two

Workgroup narrowed down to Mountain Lion and Bear:

- Top 2 most popular in survey
- They align with Characteristics, Success Criteria, and Important Mascot Qualities
- They are beloved by native Tongva people, according to Native History faculty
 - Bear is a symbol of strength, courage, intrepidness
 - Tribes called Mountain Lions teachers and viewed them as their relatives



Discussion

Athletics representatives had strong reservations about feline type mascots. They strongly preferred Bears, which would be more unique within the Community College system.

After a thorough discussion, the group voted and determined 10-2 to choose Bear over Mountain Lion for reasons including:

- It meets the Workgroup's selection criteria and success criteria.
- It makes the mascot more unique within the Community College System
- It supports more buy-in across the college for the new mascot to avoid secondary, unofficial mascots
- The beautiful symbolism of bears to Native Peoples
