

Familiarity with Moniker/Mascot







Is "Mountie" Appropriate to Represent the college? Themes Identified:

No and Unsure

- Makes them think we are connected with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police
- Does not represent our diversity
- Is outdated
- Don't understand why this moniker was chosen or its history

- Historical connection or tradition connected to the college
- Is part of the college's name and a local mountain
- Mountie is a metaphor for valuable characteristics of our study body and faculty



Is "Mountie" Appropriate to Represent the college? Comments

No and Unsure

- "The original concept of "mountaineers" is supposed to elicit thoughts of independence, perseverance, ability to face challenges and overcome them and respect and love of nature/environment. The moniker says none of these things to me. It only brings to mind the Royal Canadian Mounted Police"
- "There is no representation of the student population in the word Mountie. The word Mountie is very vague, no clear definition about a Mountie's attributes, characteristics that we can tie back to the current Mt. SAC population"

- "Mt SAC has a strong history in academics and athletics in this community. Continuation of traditions and core values illustrate important strengths for current and future students looking for those qualities in a school they choose to call their own"
- "We are surrounded by beautiful, strong, stellar mountains. The mountains provide a beautiful backdrop to our equally beautiful campus. In addition, Mounties is synonymous with the name of the College, Mt. (Mount) SAC"



Is "Joe Mountie" Appropriate to Represent the college? Themes Identified:

No and Unsure

- Does not represent our diversity/culture
- Is outdated
- Connection to Canada or Royal Canadian Mounted Police ill-suited to a southern California college

- Historical connection to or tradition of the college
- Aligns well with the college's moniker, "Mountie"
- Joe Mountie is a symbol of positive characteristics of our college community




Is "Joe Mountie" Appropriate to Represent the college? Comments

No and Unsure

- ..."Joe Mountie is a really creepy weird throwback wearing a Davy Crockett hat that was now famously worn by several of the insurrectionists on 6 Jan."
- "I don't see myself or my classmates, and in fact see a deep rooted message against us."
- "A white male does not represent what we are. Joe is sometimes pictured with a gun. I do not see how he represents a diverse, inclusive, anti-racist institution of learning at all."

- "There is familiarity and an association to the name. There is history and memories built with the name. PLEASE [DO] NOT CHANGE JUST TO CHANGE. You will be erasing memories that were built."
- "Mt. SAC moniker is very unique. The college is named after the local mountains and the history of gold miners and mountaineers. If people are offended or think it inappropriate by the moniker Mounties then just change it back to mountaineers."
- "A Mountie represents strength and courage."







Should the "Mountie" moniker be changed? Themes Identified:

No and Unsure

- Moniker has a long history and is tradition at Mt. SAC
- Enjoy or find pride in the moniker
- People see no need or reason to change the moniker

- Does not represent the diversity of our campus or the inclusive nature of Mt. SAC
- Moniker should be updated to better suit who are students are now and our future students



Should the "Mountie" moniker be changed? Comments

No and Unsure

- "As I said above, tradition is important! Having the fortitude to resist the urge to be willing to change with the whims of the climate is honorable and in my opinion, mandatory if the school is to remain the quality institution that it is..."
- "The moniker is simple and easy to remember. Complicating it is unnecessary"

- "This is the perfect opportunity and time for the college to be proactive about its image, mission, and place in the community by selecting a moniker that is more inclusive and representative of the entire campus community. In my opinion the moniker should be changed"
- "Mounties" no longer represents the mission and core values of the college. It excludes our Native American students from the community because it connotes the Canadian Mounted Police, which had a role in suppressing First Nations"



Should the "Joe Mountie" mascot be changed? Themes Identified:

No and Unsure

- Mascot represents history and tradition at Mt. SAC
- Joe Mountie is unique
- Change is unnecessary
- Mascot could be modernized

- He is not representative of the diversity or culture of Mt. SAC
- Armed mascot is inappropriate
- Human as mascot is problematic
- Joe Mountie is outdated/not relatable



Should the "Joe Mountie" mascot be changed? Comments:

No and Unsure

- "There's no reason to get rid of him. So much of the school's physical structure has changed & is evolving. Joe Mountie reminds me of the school environment that's I remember as a student. I don't want to lose him too"
- "Good or bad it's OUR Mountie. Many generations of students and faculty hold fond memories of everything MtSAC represents or meant in their lives, including Joe Mountie. Changing it would be like cutting that part off"

- "We should move away from having a person as a mascot. These are never good ideas; they have a troubled and offensive history and we are right to be moving away from this. We should let the students lead on this movement. That is what good colleges do"
- "Joe Mountie is a product of his time and has undergone multiple revisions to his appearance over the years, which have primarily been positive. However, no amount of updates to his character can erase his connections to the challenging history of his real-life counterparts"

Other Feedback

- The most common theme in these comments were those who suggested the mascot should be changed. The second most common theme were those who suggested the mascot should NOT be changed
- Many respondents provided suggestions for new mascots, with the most popular being some kind of animal (ex: Goats, eagles, mountain lion).
