A1 Gender Bias in Classroom Evaluations: Implications for Mt. SAC Faculty

B2 Round 2 AANAPISI Digital Stories: Integration of the Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) Voice and Experience through Digital Storytelling (Oral History)

After Arise Program's successful AANAPISI collaboration with, Mission College and the University of Massachusetts Boston (UMASS Boston), collaborative AANAPISI Digital Stories project in Fall 2014, the Arise Program has implemented an in-house Digital Stories project with cohort 2 in Spring 2016. Mt. SAC students across various programming participated in a semester long project to reflect on their personal life and to create alternate media projects based on their real life experiences. Utilizing resources on Mt. SAC's campus, our staff worked relentlessly together with students, by examining their own life by reflecting on their experiences, significant events, and important people while looking at its intersections within education. Attend this session to learn about the students who participated in the project and who identify as Samoan or Tongan, sometimes collectively described as Polynesians or "Polys", Filipino, Kenyan, Mexican and students who embrace a multi-ethnic identity. Consider how this cultural-based curriculum pedagogy enables students to compare and contrast their experiences against themes of self-doubt, community stereotypes, experiences with racism or discrimination, family strength, individual strength, divorce, overcoming adversity, and cultural values and orientation Evaluate how the integration of our student voices and experiences into course content can diversify the curriculum. Imagine how this alternate media provides innovation in teaching strategies. Let these students' voices inspire your work and passion. Flex your power as an educator.

C1 Diversity on the Mt. SAC Campus (A comparison of student comments from 1980 and 2016)

In 1980 I interviewed 150 students asking if they had ever experienced what they would consider to be prejudice from a faculty, or administrative employee. They were also asked what they would tell a member of the faculty, or staff if they wanted to improve their relationship with minority groups on campus.

This was repeated in 2016 by interviewing 50 students from my Human Sexuality course.

C3 Addressing the Barriers for Students with Autism in a College Setting

The purpose of this presentation is to help faculty members understand the academic, communication, and social barriers faced by students on the Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) in a college setting. Participants will learn about the DSP&S initiative: the Puzzle Project, a series of workshops that promote social skills and self-advocacy in an academic environment. Common challenges faced by faculty, staff, and healthcare providers like behavior management and conduct issues will be addressed. Resources will be provided so that faculty and staff understand who to contact when an ASD student is disruptive in the classroom.

C4 Mindfulness: Breathe Your Way to Stress Relief

You've heard the term: mindfulness. What does it mean? What doesn't it mean? Does it really work to create calm and relaxation? Anne Castagnaro, a 500-hour Registered Yoga and Meditation Teacher (RYT 500), will introduce the definitions and benefits of mindfulness meditation and breathwork. Stress-induced difficulties and lack of concentration can be stabilized through breathwork. Attendees will experience how regulating the breath can achieve this stabilization. We will explore how an imbalance in emotions can lead to stress-related illnesses and how staying present through mindfulness can abate certain illnesses. Attendees will have an opportunity to practice different techniques that can be integrated into their own lives and permeate their teaching environment.
