











BASIC NEEDS INSECURITY FALL 2019




BASIC NEEDS INSECURITY PANDEMIC

HOW TO HELP

- Affirm that students are <u>not</u> alone
- Be human; share your struggles
- This makes teaching <u>easier</u>



HOW TO HELP

- Establish that basic needs are an academic concern
- Use short surveys to ask how they are
- Use that info to send quick check-ins



A BASIC NEEDS STATEMENT FOR THE SYLLABUS

- Invite students to seek help in order to succeed academically
- Direct them towards support
- Invite them to connect with you

"We learn as whole people. To learn effectively you must have basic security: a roof over your head, a safe place to sleep, enough food to eat. If you're having trouble with any of those things, please talk with me or with the Dean of Students. Together we can work to make sure those needs are met."

QUICK SURVEYS CONVEY CARE

- What sorts of responsibilities do you have, apart from this class? (i.e. working, taking care of kids or family, taking a heavy course load, etc.)
- What challenges are you currently facing or do you anticipate facing this semester?
- Do you have any concerns related to the technology/devices you will be using to complete work in this course? If so, please describe.
- What else do you want me to know about you so that I can support you to succeed this term?





- Share supports relevant to their lives



"I noticed on your survey that you've got kids. I know that can be a lot. How's it going?"


"Thanks for sharing on the survey that you're having trouble paying for food. Please, reach out to the Dean of Students— emergency aid is available."

THINK FLEXIBLY

- Offer both synchronous and asynchronous virtual support
- Help them focus on their growth> absolute standards



CONSIDER UNGRADING

Instead use qualitative assessment, peer review, and self-assessment

Results? Enhanced trust, greater student motivation, more knowledge into how they learn


Most powerful for marginalized students



UNGRADING IN CLARISSA SORENSEN-UNRUH'S ORGANIC CHEMISTRY CENTRAL NEW MEXICO COMMUNITY COLLEGE

- Students take closed book exams and grade the exams themselves
- For each question they indicate how confident they are in the answer (using an emoji!)
- They sort out the wrong answers, decide how to assign points, and submit corrections on the wrong answers
- The instructor provides written feedback and a point total for the assignment





WATCH FOR SIGNS OF TROUBLE

- Student is MIA not completing assignments or coming to class
- Student comes to class but doesn't respond to messages or do surveys
- Student indicates any basic needs insecurity on the surveys



EMERGENCY AID IS CRITICAL


- 1. It is flexible—far more so than free food
- 2. It allows people to meet their own needs with dignity
- 3. Done right, it conveys care

ADVOCATE


- Include students in stimulus payments and unemployment
