These supporters are essential for the future of community colleges and the growth potential is tremendous. Perspectives from a variety of institutions will be shared. President Drumm led the Northern Wyoming Community College District at a time when fundraising was highly successful, raising over \$100 million in public and private funds. His transition to SUNY Broome Community College energized fundraising at that institution, as evidenced by the receipt of a \$10 million gift – the largest in institutional history. President Drummer has previous, direct experience in College Advancement offices as an Executive Director and now as a college president, faces a statewide transition in Connecticut that has the potential to influence future fundraising opportunities in an adverse manner. President Irving (AACC Board Member) has a background in continuing education and professional development.</p>

	<p>He has built donor relationships across four states through partnerships with business and industry. President Simone (PASI Executive Committee Member) has collaborated with several ambitious, local supporters to form a new 501c3 organization.
