California Community Colleges Chancellor Eloy Ortiz Oakley Taps Marty J. Alvarado to Lead Educational Services and Support

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — California Community Colleges Chancellor Eloy Ortiz Oakley today announced that Marty J. Alvarado has joined the state Chancellor's Office as executive vice chancellor for educational services.

Alvarado most recently served as senior director at Jobs for the Future, a national organization aimed

at driving innovation in the workforce and education, and previously held senior leadership roles, including workforce development director, at Long Beach City College.

Alvarado will be responsible for agency-wide policies and programs related to student support, instructional delivery, and curriculum with the aim of increasing student completion rates and closing achievement gaps as articulated in the Vision for Success.

Prior to joining the Chancellor's Office, Alvarado provided support for scaling up regional cross-sector partnerships and state systems engaged in large scale transformation. This work focused on building regional ecosystems to support pathways to college and career success and economic advancement across the state.



"With almost 20 years of experience in higher education and the community college system, Alvarado comes with a track record of innovation and brings expertise in program design, cross-sector community engagement and learning strategies," Oakley said.

Alvarado received a bachelor's degree in philosophy from Whittier College, and a master of arts in philosophy and cultural analysis from the Universiteit van Amsterdam located in the Netherlands.
