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**Letter of Interest Form**

As many of you are aware, there is a crisis of housing insecurity and homelessness among California community college students. A recent survey, conducted across the California Community College system, found that 19% of student respondents had experienced homelessness in the previous 12 months.

In recognition of these alarming data, the California State Legislature included \$9 million of ongoing funds in Assembly Bill 74 for colleges with the greatest need to implement a Homeless and Housing Insecurity Pilot Program. This pilot program is designed to address homelessness among California community college students. This legislation requires that funding be used to support rapid rehousing efforts that assist homeless and housing insecure college students. ***Campuses will be required to establish partnerships with community organizations that have experience providing wraparound services and rental subsidies for homeless and housing insecure students.***

The Chancellor's Office is committed to a transparent and equitable funding distribution process related to the College Homeless and Housing Insecure Pilot Program. Colleges interested in participating in the College Homeless and Housing Insecure Pilot Program must complete the Letter of Interest form (below). Colleges must provide all requested data. These data will be used to identify colleges with the greatest need from within each of the seven defined regions within the California Community College system. Each of the data fields below will be assigned a designated weight regarding overall need, and the combined need score will be uniformly determined across all applying colleges.

Per the attached memo, the first group of colleges selected to participate in the College Homeless and Housing Insecure pilot program will receive funding amounts ranging from \$500,000 to \$700,000 annually over a three-year period. Over the course of the three-year funding period, participating colleges are required to develop a sustainability plan, as funding to these colleges will cease at the end of the three-year funding cycle. At that time, a second cohort of colleges will be selected to participate in the College Homeless and Housing Insecure Pilot Program.

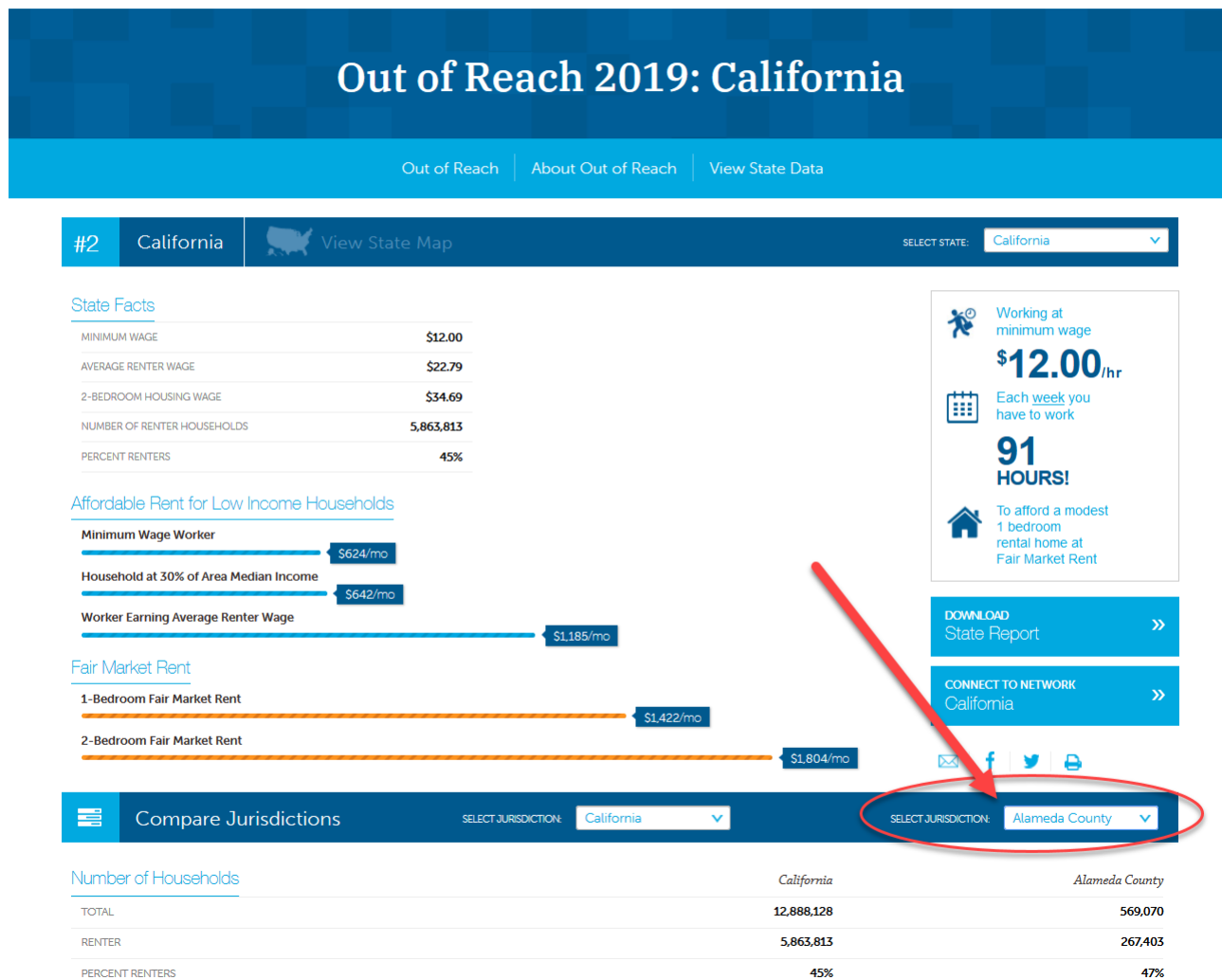

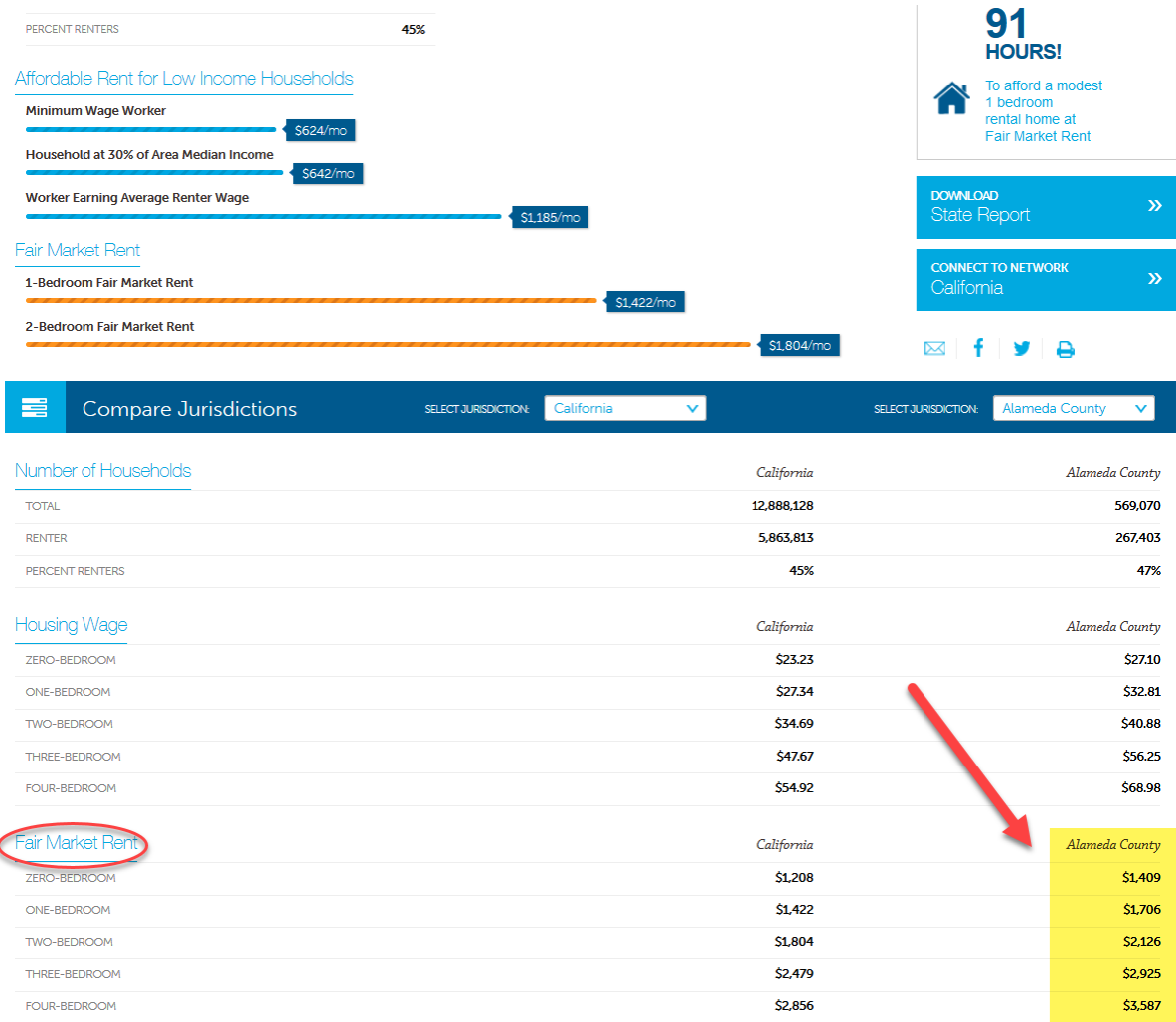

### Household Characteristics of Voucher Holders for Sonoma County Community Development Commission

#### Waiting List and Tenancy

According to the 2016 Q4 Picture of Subsidized Households database, the housing authority's voucher program has an **annual turnover of 8%** having issued approximately 316 vouchers in the past year. The average voucher holder has received housing benefits for 8 years and 7 months. According to the 2016 PSH database, persons who were issued a voucher in the preceding 12 months waited an average of 57 months on the waiting list<sup>1</sup>.

#### Income Characteristics

According to 2016 Q4 Picture of Subsidized Households data, the average voucher household contains 1.7 persons and has a household income of \$16,471 per year. 93% of households were very low income (VLI) and 71% were extremely low income (ELI). 20% of households had wages as a major source of income, 4% of households had welfare (TANF, General Assistance or Public Assistance) as their primary source of income, and 75% of households had other income (Social Security, Disability or Pension) as their major source of income.


