Finish Line Scholars Program

Colleagues,

Today, I am pleased to share with you the exciting launch of the California Community Colleges Finish Line Scholars Program. Finish Line will provide scholarships to community college students who are halfway through their course of study to enable them to finish their goal of completing a certificate or degree or transferring to a college or university. It will also provide emergency financial aid to students facing unexpected financial hardships. Thirty-four community colleges are eligible for the program in the three regions of California with the lowest percentage of adults who have college degrees: the Inland Empire, the Central Valley, and the Far North. The program is designed to support achievement of goal six in our *Vision for Success*, which focuses on reducing regional achievement gaps for students.

The Finish Line Scholars Program is made possible through an extraordinary philanthropic gift, a pledge of **\$100 million** over 20 years to support our students. We believe this gift to the Foundation for California Community Colleges is the largest for community colleges in the nation to date. It will make a meaningful, measurable, and lasting difference by helping more students overcome challenges and go all-in to achieve their educational goals. Plus, in the long-term, it will help build a well prepared workforce, a strong economy, and a bright future for communities in these regions.

The first year's funding will be distributed to students as emergency financial aid. This focus is critical as students struggle to stay enrolled in the face of a health and economic crisis. Grants of up to \$150,000 will be made to the 34 colleges by the Foundation for California Community Colleges beginning this fall to support students during the current 2020-21 academic year.

In future years, the 34 colleges will be eligible for annual grants to support scholarships and emergency financial aid.

- Scholarships of up to \$18,500 per year will help students go all-in to reach the finish line
 of their goal, whether that is to complete a certificate or degree or transfer, and can be
 used to cover expenses such as textbooks, equipment, transportation, housing, and
 food.
- Emergency financial aid will be flexible to help students overcome short-term financial barriers. Up to 20% of funds, in future years, can be used for emergency financial aid.
