COOPERATIVE INSTITUTIONAL RESEARCH PROGRAM (CIRP)

The annual freshmen survey of incoming students throughout the country has been conducted over the past 51 years.





- Mt. San Antonio College (Mt. SAC) has participated numerous times over the years.
- The following information will focus on the most current (2016) survey and make comparisons to the previous 9-year surveyed data.

To Whom It May Concern:

I am an incoming Mt. SAC student. I identify as Latino/a, but my native language is English. My parents have an income of less than \$24,999/year, and as I am somewhat concerned with my ability to finance my college education. I plan on living with my parents or another relative for the upcoming fall term and getting a job to help pay for college. Although I did not have the opportunity to take advanced courses prior to college, I did well in high school and for the most part received mainly A or B grades.

Mt. SAC was my first choice, predominantly because of its good reputation, but also because of the cost of tuition and graduates tend to get better jobs. My primary focus will be on a degree in Health, Business, or either one of the following such as: Agriculture, English, History, Political Science, Fine Arts, Mathematics, Computer Science, Justice and Security, Liberal Science, or other Non-Technical major. I would like to get an Associate's degree, but a Bachelor's or Master's degree would be more desirable. These might help me in the future as I consider being well off financially my most essential, or at least a very important, objective. However, helping others in need, and raising a family are also important to me.

I make time for both school and a social life; over the last year I spent time studying with other students but I have other interests such as volunteering and attending religious services. I have also spent time asking teachers for advice after class (I believe there is a very good chance I will be doing this in college as well); as well as, using the internet for research. Politically, I am middle-of-the-road, but I think that global warming should be a federal priority, wealthy people should pay more in taxes then they do now, that there is a need for more gun control, and affirmative action in college admissions should be abolished.

I spent my time in very diverse ways. In a typical week, I managed to spend at least 3 hours or more socializing with my friends, using social media (Facebook, Twitter, etc.) and even studying or doing homework. Additionally, I was able to participate in student club activities for no more than 3 hours a week. For the most part, I think the chances I have in attaining at least a "B" average are highly probable. Unfortunately, I will have to cut back and evaluate the way most of my time is spent because getting a job is a necessity, which helps pay for the cost of college tuition.





















CIRP HIGHLIGHTS

Demographics

- Majority of incoming 2016 students are Latino/a. This is consistent with Mt. SAC's average population.
- There has been an increasing amount of incoming students over the age of 18 over the past surveyed years.
 - Just over half of incoming students will be of age 18 or under.

Finances

- About a third of incoming students come from a low income family, which is consistent with the past 9 surveyed years.
- Majority of students plan on:
 - Having at least some concern for how they will pay for their tuition.

Academia

- Health professional, Business, and 'Other/Undecided' are the most popular majors for 2016.
- Physical Sciences, Education and Arts and Humanity are the least popular majors in the past 9 surveyed years.
- The Majority of students plan on continuing their education after Mt. SAC to receive at least a Bachelor and others will continue to further work for their Masters degree (preferably).

 The majority of Mt. SAC students reported middle-of-the-road as their political standing







WHAT IS THE STRONGEST FEELING YOU HAVE ABOUT BEING A NEW COLLEGE STUDENT AT MT. SAC?











 The majority of students (57.2%) reported being excited about becoming a new college student. However, fear or anxiety were present in approximately 39% of reporting students.

 Over 69% of students reported attending Mt. SAC to transfer to a university and 53.2% of incoming students expect to earn an Associate degree.

• The greatest challenge incoming students anticipate is knowing which classes to take (42.9%).

 Nearly 57% of students report that support services such as counseling and educational advisement or tutoring and instructional assistance will be necessary to reach their goals.

 Financial aid or on campus jobs (38.6%) are becoming increasingly important to our students.
