
Identify one person or one group that you know or are familiar with. Then analyze (break down) the factors that pushed or pulled them to the United States.

During the Covid pandemic in 2020 and 2021, many people were having trouble paying bills, some people lost their jobs, others became very sick, and still others lost friends or family members. It was a difficult time for many of us. Yet most people feel grateful for surviving that experience.

Tell a story about something kind that you did for someone else, and explain how that made you feel afterward.



- Are there real-world examples you can think of where the USA has stepped into help victims of violence or persecution? How do these examples support your stance on this topic?
- Make connections to oppression, the bystander effect, social justice.
- Use at least one quote sandwich in your LSW. Your quote sandwich must be from one of our class sources.

Incorporate relevant vocabulary and examples from this week's readings, tasks, and activities, and support your ideas with specific details and examples whenever possible. If you decide to use quotations or paraphrases, don't forget to cite the sources you used.






