Basic Sentence Patterns

Simple Sentence

S – V.

Brainsly studied for the exam.

Simple Sentence with a Compound Verb

S - V and V.

He reviewed the sentence card *and* **wrote** practice sentences.

Compound Sentence

S – V, conjunction **S – V**.

Brainsly studied, but Slackersly fell asleep.

S - V; transition, S - V.

Brainsly passed the exam; however, Slackersly failed it.

Complex Sentence

Subordinator **S – V**, **S – V**.

Because he had studied hard, Brainsly aced the exam.

S – V subordinator **S – V**.

Brainsly aced the exam because **he had studied** hard.

Compound-Complex Sentence

S - V, conjunction S - V subordinator S - V.

Brainsly wrote a rough draft, and he went to the tutoring center because he needed help.

Subordinator S - V, S - V, conjunction S - V.

Although he hadn't studied, Slackersly expected to pass, but he was wrong.
